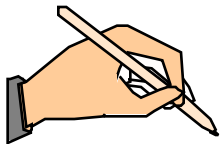

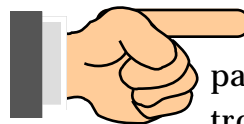
Simulated Emergency Test

The ARRL Simulated Emergency Test (SET) will be held on Saturday, October 3 this year.

There has been a call for the local ARES groups to utilize HF more than in the past. The

WCARC will have operators stationed at the Clubhouse to pass traffic to the State ARES control station in Columbus on 75 meters. At around 10:00 am EDST, the WCARC

ARES Net will be brought up on 147.18+ to take check-ins. There is no plan for a simulated (or real) emergency that would involve mobile travel or a scenario to be acted out. All you have to do is give the Net Control operator a call. So here is a chance to stand by at home and be a part of the Net. Let's see if we can get a lot of participation this year!



The New Restructuring Proposal

You may have heard by now that a lot of controversy has been stirred up by a new initiative from the ARRL to restructure the amateur licensing scheme. The ARRL believes that the time is ripe since the FCC is implementing a complete review of the entire licensing structure which it administers. To make a long story short, the ARRL Executive Committee believes that restructuring is coming, like it or not, and that it's better for amateurs to have a proposal on the table than for the FCC to tell us what they think should happen. An important part of their considerations was that no currently licensed ham would lose privileges.

The plan involves 4 classes of license: A, B, C and D. The Class D is the entry level license, and it carries the current privileges of the Technician license and all amateurs currently licensed as Technicians will become Class D. The exam would be at the same level of difficulty as the present Technician test (3A), and would contain questions relevant to VHF/UHF operation.

There is **no** Morse Code component for Class D.

The next level is Class C, which carries the same privileges as the present General Class with expanded phone bands on 75 m and 15 m by 50 KHz and on 40 m by 25 KHz (3800 to 4000 KHz; 21,250 to 21,450 KHz; and 7200 to 7300 KHz). All current holders of Novice, Technician Plus and General would receive Class C status. The exam for Class C would cover material relevant to HF operation similar to the current element 3B, and there would be a 5 wpm code test.

The Class B privileges include the present Advanced Class with expanded phone bands on 75 m and 15 m by 50 KHz and on 40 m by 25 KHz (3725 to 4000 KHz; 21,175 to 21,450 KHz; and 7125 to 7300 KHz). The test for Class B is similar to the current Advanced exam (4A) plus a 12 wpm code test. All present holders of Advanced Class would become Class B licensees.

Finally, we come to Class A, which conveys

all the privileges of the Extra Class plus expanded phone on 75 m and 15 m by 50 KHz, and on 40 m by 25 KHz (3700 to 400 KHz; 21,150 to 21,450 KHz; and 7125 to 7300 KHz). The Class A test involves a written exam similar to the present test (4B), but with no code test. The test would include more questions pertaining to modern modes of communication and digital electronics.

All amateurs currently holding Extra Class licenses would become Class A operators.

You will notice that the main thrusts of this proposal are the following major ideas:

- the Novice Class is abolished
- the Novice CW bands are converted to phone bands for Classes C, B and A
- all licensees currently holding HF privileges by virtue of passing a code test will become Class C or higher
- the entry level license becomes no-code and conveys VHF/UHF privileges
- the highest speed code test is 12 wpm, which is the hurdle to upgrade from Class C to Class B.

Needless to say, the proposal has prompted a great deal of discussion and controversy. If you want to put your two cents' worth in, simply write your comments to the ARRL. Remember, it is only a *proposal* at the current stage, and it is subject to modification if there is a strong sentiment expressed.
